Principal's Perspective

Following on from our highly successful 2015 NCEA results, we had the opportunity on Monday, to celebrate those students who received Merit, and Excellence Endorsements. We are very proud of our students' achievements, and I would like to acknowledge all students who worked to the best of their ability, regardless of the level of achievement they received. I would also like to thank the parents/caregivers/whanau members who were able to attend, and share in our acknowledgement of the academic success.

Although we are we are doing very well with student achievement, not all groups within the school are consistently achieving at the same high level. It is important we identify where this is happening, and look at ways in which we can make improvements. An example of this, is that this week, four senior staff have been participating in the wananga at the Rehua Marae, which forms part of our school-wide professional learning and development, to support the raising of Maori achievement. The programme is called Kia Eke Panuku – "Building on Success", and is currently being implemented by approximately 70 secondary schools across the country. Its aim is to improve our understanding of cultural responsiveness and relational pedagogy, and use this to support improving academic outcomes for our students.

Unfortunately the weather did not play its part for our Athletics Sports this year, resulting in the cancellation of the event. The Canterbury Athletics Championships will be held next week, and this will, at least, give our top athletes an opportunity to compete.

We wish them all the best for the competitions ahead.

Engagement Reports

Change of day for Engagement Reports being emailed home

Academic Counselling

Academic Counselling (AC), is a collaborative approach to improve academic outcomes for *all* students. It aims to personalise an appropriate learning pathway for each student, and helps track individual academic progress. Using the AC process, students are able to set relevant goals to ensure success. It takes into account students engagement reports, achievement, and attendance data.

Student Interviews – Year 10 -13

Next week, we begin our Academic Counselling Student Interviews. Students have been prepared for this through a recent extended form time, where each student completed an AC Interview Preparation Sheet. This sheet provided students with a chance to reflect on their previous achievement and engagement, to set their 'Academic Goal' for 2016. Following on from this we have held our Academic Assemblies on Monday for Years 11- 13.

Over the next three weeks, all students from Years 10-13, will have a 10 minute interview with their Academic Counsellor. During this time, they will formalise their Academic Goal for the year, discuss their current engagement and achievement, to ensure they are on track to achieve their personal best. It would be useful to ask your child about their interview, and discuss their goal and how they will go about reaching it.

AC Conference Day

Conference Day has become a permanent feature in our school calendar, and allows parents/caregivers to partake in the collaboration of AC. This day continues to be a very successful and productive, and receives an immense amount of support from our parent community. This year Conference Day will be held on Thursday 2nd June, and details relating to this day will be available early next term.
