A Notice from the Canterbury District Health Board



March 6 2019

Since 26 February 2019, the number of cases in the latest Canterbury measles outbreak has been steadily climbing, and as at 5 March we have had ten confirmed cases, with more likely to be confirmed over the next days and weeks. Some are children who have yet to complete their MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) vaccinations, but four are adults aged between 27 and 50 who have had only one measles vaccination, which was standard practice between 1969 and 1990. Cases have now spread throughout Christchurch.

Measles is a serious and highly contagious, viral disease where up to 30 percent of those who catch it will develop complications - usually children under 5 and adults over the age of 20. Measles during pregnancy increases the risk of miscarriage, premature labour, and low birth-weight in babies. Measles is spread through droplets in the air and through contact, so that anyone unprotected who has been in the same room as someone with measles will likely get it.

The surest protection is for people to have had both of their MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccinations, scheduled to be given to children at 15 months and at four years. As long as children of school age are up-to-date with their vaccinations they should be protected against measles. People vaccinated between 1969 and 1990 should contact their GP team who will provide a booster vaccination. People born before 1969 will have been exposed to measles and will be immune.

Family members who aren't sure if they have been immunised with two doses of MMR vaccine should talk to their GP team who will be able to provide a vaccination if they need it. An extra vaccination will not cause any harm.

Measles symptoms include:

- o A respiratory type of illness with dry cough, runny nose, headache
- o Temperature over 38.5 C and feeling very unwell
- o A red blotchy rash starts on day 4-5 of the illness usually on the face and moves to the chest and arms.

If you think your child has measles, keep them away from other children. If they are already sick they should stay home for at least five days after symptoms such as a rash appeared.

School Strike 4 Climate Change

The following letter was emailed home to all parents/caregivers on Monday 4th March

Dear Parent/Caregiver,

You may be aware that on March 15th, a School Strike 4 Climate Change rally is planned to be held in Cathedral Square, Christchurch at 1pm and students are being encouraged to attend via social media and other means.

How the school responds has been discussed by the Board and staff and the majority of secondary schools in the region if not all, are taking a common approach to the event. Here are a number of points we believe you need to know if you are considering your son/daughters attendance:

- While the school feels the impact of climate change is a significant global issue, we believe there are other ways for students to express their support for the cause that do not disrupt learning at school. For instance, a weekend rally could have been held, letters could be written to those with influence in this cause, social media could be used to gather support and there will be more. Therefore the school does not support the timing of the event.
- Our understanding is that the event has no named organiser and no plans for management on the day; if they
 do exist, they have not been brought to our attention. The Police are aware though that this event is
 happening.
- Schools would find it very difficult to prevent students from attending and we will not be doing so. Given our
 duty of care though for students, if your son/daughter is going to attend, we need your approval indicating you
 know they are there. Such approval means that the school has no responsibility for the student once they
 leave the school gates.
- Any student who has provided parent approval to attend the event, will be marked on the schools attendance register as an Explained absence (E) but an Unjustified absence (U).
- We have no position on the wearing of uniform to the event if students attend as any enforcement would be almost impossible this will be a decision you and your son/daughter make.
- While we are not encouraging students to attend, at our school, there will be an opportunity provided for students to be 'released' from class or school at 11.35am (end of Period 3) to minimise disruption to those staying in class.

The report by the Tomorrow's School Independent Taskforce <u>Our Schooling Futures: Stronger Together | Whiria Ngā Kura Tūātinitini</u> was released in December 2018. The Independent Taskforce is now very keen to receive feedback from as many people as possible to help them complete their final recommendations.

Public consultation on the report is now open and we really encourage school staff, board members, PTA members, parents, whānau and wider school community to have their say on the future of our schooling system:

- The Taskforce will be holding public consultation meetings around the country. These have already begun and will finish on Wednesday, 27 March. We really encourage everyone to come along to these events and discuss the future of our schooling system. - Postcards: for students, families and anyone who just wants to briefly 'have their say' on a recommendation or the full report. Freepost postcards will be available at the public meetings.

Consultation closes 7 April 2019. We want everyone to have their say and we want to do our very best to listen carefully to what is said.
