Year 12 Emerging Leaders Conference

Fifteen Papanui High School Year 12 students joined about 450 other students from 28 schools across Canterbury to learn about leadership from a range of inspiring speakers at a one-day leadership conference on Tuesday at Christ's College. Students took part in a range of workshops including self-leadership, positive well-being, creative leadership, servant leadership, and functional leadership.

Five of the students have written about their day.

Maia: I enjoyed the experiences, getting to meet new people, being able to work on my leadership style and make connections with other leaders outside Papanui High School. It helped us connect and have a unified front going into next year as potential head students. It was important to us that we stepped out of our comfort zones, once we managed to do that it helped us to have more in depth discussions with the other emerging leaders around us. The day away from school helped us all to form bonds with other leaders of other schools. This will be important if schools are ever collaborating together as it will allow us to have a better connection to them.



Sam: I really enjoyed myself yesterday. It was cool to have a day away from school where we could socialise, discover, and work as a team for the day. This helped us connect as a team and I hope we have a new found bond that we can continue to use throughout leadership this year. We also caught up with students/leaders from other schools who we haven't seen for years and got to learn about how they used leadership in their school, and who they look up to as their leaders!

Jack: I took a lot from the talk from Abbas Nazari about taking a step back from a situation and looking at the bigger picture. To consider things from other people's perspectives instead of just focusing on your own. I also enjoyed Jake Bailey's talk on values because it gave me a chance to think about the things that were important to me, and have a chance to express that.

Emily: One thing that I took away from the conference was that leadership can come in many forms, and being a leader looks different for everyone. All of the different speakers had their own forms of leadership and how they had applied it to their own personal stories. It was helpful to hear all of their opinions on what makes a successful leader because it showed how two people could have very different ways of leading and still both be successful and well respected. A theme that I noticed many of the various speakers bring up was vulnerability as a leader, and how being willing to fail and take ownership for failure is crucial. I thought this was an important point as it was something that all of the students attending the conference could relate to and apply to their own lives.

Madi: From this experience, I learned the barriers students may come across on their pathway into leadership and how these can be solved to improve our traits and skills. This allowed me to reflect on myself and think of ways that I can overcome my own barriers that are stopping me from moving forwards in not only leadership but within my school, my whānau, and my friends. The part I found most interesting about this event was the student panel of leaders from schools around canterbury. They expressed their thoughts and opinions on topics such as 'how Te Ao Māori connects to leadership' which I strongly related to as Te Ao Māori is very important to my identity and to all New Zealanders. I learned ways of showing leadership through service in both my school and community that can help benefit others on their own journey.

Whānau Awhina Plunket online Babysitting Course

Plunket Education in Schools' Babysitting Course is available for teenagers all over Aotearoa.

This course is designed to give high school students the knowledge and skills to babysit children of all ages. It's written for first time babysitters; students don't need to have previous experience to enrol.

The course ideal for students aged 14 and above and takes around 2-3 hours to complete.

Students work through nine sequential modules and on completion of the course and the final quiz will receive a certificate certified by Whānau Awhina Plunket to show employers that they have completed this course and are ready to babysit. As well as the certificate the students are sent a Babysitter's Manual that supports all the information they have learned in the course.

During the course the following topics are covered:

- the role of the babysitter, including the expectations of the families you are working for
- ages and stages of children from birth to school age, their basic needs and their care
- professional behaviour including your presentation
- how to engage with children of different ages, including activities for each age group and behavioural information
- safety, including emergency situations, keeping yourself and the children safe, and basic first aid
- how to get a babysitting job.

Year 10 Leadership

This term the Year 10 Leadership Class has been working on individual choice group projects that allow them to showcase the leadership skills they have learned, and attributes they have developed throughout Term 1.

The class developed three projects in total. These were; running a multi-sport event at Bishopdale Primary School for their Year 5 & 6 students, organising the Term 3 Cantamath event for our Kahui Ako Primary Schools, and most recently the beautifying Papanui activity which saw the class collect litter from the Papanui Domain, Bridgestone Reserve, St James Park, and the walkway that connects them all.

The students did an exceptional job organising and managing these events, and were able to hone their communication and organisation skills as well as needing to show their ability to be patient and resilient when working on a group project. They can be very proud of the projects they undertook and it was fantastic to get great feedback from the community about the conduct of our students as we collected litter.



Public Health Service for Students

Did you know we have a Public Health Service available to Students?

Students just need to text the service and they will make contact and arrange a time to meet.

"We are a team of nurses available to come out to schools to see students for appointments. We offer free and confidential care.

We are experienced in discussing sexual health concerns. If there is something you want to talk about or get help with and you feel uncomfortable talking to your parents, caregivers or doctor, that's what we are here for - to give good advice about sex and healthy behaviours. We are great listeners if you have concerns about relationships, and whether you are feeling vulnerable or unsafe.

We can also help with other health issues like sleeping, eating and period concerns.

Obviously, young people can have many other health issues and it may not always be clear who you should talk to:

In general, if it is a *physical* issue such as pain, injuries or illness– your family doctor is the best person to see.

If your concerns are more around mood, feelings, anxiety or general well-being, your teacher or school counsellor are best, or again your family doctor.

If for any reason you are having trouble accessing these other people, we can help with that.

So how do you get in touch with us??

We offer a text to book service – text us with your name and school, and we reply offering an appointment time with one of our nurses to come and meet at school, usually at lunchtime. You are welcome to bring a friend with you to your appointment.

Our text number is on the posters you will see around school, and we are free!"
